We begin this new decade with triumphs, challenges, and changes.

TRIUMPHS

Anthesis is (nearly) ready for the new federal Home & Community Based Services (HCBS) regulations to go into effect on March 17, 2022.

This achievement has been a huge focus of ours over the past few years, and has required tremendous effort and dedication from everyone at Anthesis. Today, our five ongoing programs (SE, DATS, IECBS, ADC & RASS) incorporate the requisite community integration component of this regulation. As you can see in the faces of the people highlighted in this report, these programs have been quite successful in Empowering People with [Dis]abilities to Blossom!

CHALLENGES

Anthesis' revenue is dependent on our compliance with this new regulation. Revamping our services, training our staff, and managing this cultural shift while still providing excellent service to our 300 program participants, was a tremendous challenge. We want to commend the staff and managers who have had to learn a whole new way of doing business, while continuing to deliver quality services. Change is never easy and we are proud of the team we've built at Anthesis to lead us through this change.

In addition to federal funds, Anthesis also relies on state funding to support our services. While the Governor and Legislature did approve an 8% rate increase for Developmental Disability (DD) service reimbursements, our programs continue to remain woefully underfunded. These funds represent a mere 20% of the funding needed to pay care providers a decent wage. Many of our direct care staff work multiple jobs to make ends meet and

stay with us because they love their jobs and the people we serve. In 2020, we ask for your support in advocating with us to make additional funding a priority with our elected officials.

Finally, since the 2017 Tax Law changes went into effect, there has been a national downward trend in charitable contributions from individual donors. We have certainly felt this impact at Anthesis. Individual donations were down in 2018, and again in 2019. We rely on these donations to help us bridge the gap between government funding and our costs. Now that we have addressed the critical HCBS regulations, this will be an area of focus for us in 2020.

CHANGES

Unfortunately, HCBS compliance necessitated the closure of our foundational facility-based program. We worked closely with each of the 125 individuals affected by this change to find the communityintegrated program that best fit their needs and talents.

This program closure also meant we no longer needed the 37,000-square-feet of production space at Brooks Street. In 2019 we sold this property, which has acted as the corporate headquarters and base for our Employment programs for 40 years. Our new headquarters is a 9,000 square-footbuilding at the corner of Mountain Ave. and 6th St. in Ontario. We hope to have our ADA renovations completed in the coming months and hope you will come visit our new home when we celebrate at our Open House.








Anthesis To Move Its ⁰² Corporate Headquarters


In October, Anthesis closed escrow on an office building at the corner of Mountain Ave. and 6th St. in Ontario which will become our corporate headquarters and base for our Employment programs. This two-story building will provide our organization with great marketing visibility and easy access from all parts of Los Angeles and San Bernardino counties. We look forward to moving into our new home in the 2nd quarter of 2020.



Anthesis became the first organization in our area to receive certification from the Department of Rehabilitation for our services in Customized Employment.

Person-Centered Thinking Training

In 2019, we received a State grant to provide additional training for our staff in Person-Centered Thinking (PCT). This central component of the Home & Community Based Services (HCBS) regulations is required to continue to receive funding from the Federal government after 2022. With these funds we have already provided initial staff training, and are in the process of training two of our managers, Lucy Yamas-Cortez and Jessica Jorski, to become certified trainers in PCT.
